Highway Driving Tips

The high speeds, constant merging and heavy traffic of highways can be both dangerous and intimidating.

When driving on the highway, there are a number of things to be aware of:

- Merging—The first step to driving on the highway is merging onto it in the first place. When using the on-ramp, accelerate so that your speed matches that of traffic in the lane that you intend to enter.
- Lane changes—Once you're on the highway, merging between lanes can be dangerous. Take extra precaution to check your blind spots and avoid unnecessary lane changes.
- Passing—Different drivers prefer to travel at different speeds on the highway. As a general rule of thumb, slower traffic should keep to the right-hand lane so that faster traffic can pass on the left.
- Emergencies—Do not ever stop your vehicle on a highway unless you have an emergency. If you must, pull over as far as you can into the shoulder on the side of the road and turn your hazards on. If an emergency vehicle is approaching, do not come to a complete stop, but slow down and move as far to the right as possible to allow them to pass.
- Focus—Distracted driving is very dangerous even at low speeds. On the highway, taking your attention away from the road for even a split second can result in serious accidents, life-changing injuries and death. Take the time to set your GPS or any music or entertainment when you first get into the car so that you do not become distracted later.

When you're behind the wheel, the risk of an accident comes with the territory. On the highway, consequences can be even higher, so be as safe as possible.
